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Greetings to all readers and, of course, my best wishes to you for a happy Christmas.

Dear Friends,

As a Christian and occasional Preacher, Christmas is a particularly enjoyable time for me and I always hope that others, in the midst of their festivities (and excesses) will notice that it is called CHRISTmas, and be reminded a little of what it is supposed to be about. However – no sermons allowed in CHESS NEWS SHEETS, but do please allow me to sincerely wish God's Blessing on you and your family at this special time of the year.

AND NOW TO THE CHESS NEWS.

NOVAG. Congratulations to Novag for the CONSTELLATION EXPERT's excellent 17th. place out of 400 in the French Open when it secred $8\frac{1}{2}/11$. This included $7\frac{1}{2}/10$ against officially Rated Opponents averaging out at 1879 ELO (this figure is slightly approximate due to having to adjust the internal French Ratings which are different to both ELO and BCF). The Performance Rating for this comes out at 2079 and I think Eureka will send you copies of all the Games for £2. I emphasise 'all' because its a nice change not to get just the wins! Estimated Ratings for Fidelity and Scicys Machines in the US Open are given later in the News Sheet.

FIDELITY. Every Chess Magazine that comes through the post-box seems to contain the latest information sheet about the EXCELLENCE for which Competence seem continually able to find better and better things to advertise. However the results from other Distributors and Consumers are not up to the same high standard. Mike Healey of Countrywide Computers sent me an Informatic Pack containing details of his Tests with the EXCELLENCE and the N.CONST 3.6. The Const 3.6 is known to play 'above itself' at Blitz and Speed Levels and showed itself superior to the Excellence here. At $\frac{1}{2}-1$ min. per move their relative ability evened out; then at Tournament Levels the Excellence proved itself the better. These 2 Machines are the best for Playing Ability that I know of at present under £150. The other Competitor in the price range is the SUPER ENTERPRISE which has more functions, is cheaper BUT between 50-100 ELO points behind them. I expect Countrywide Computers will let you have copies of the games if you write them nicely and send a stamp.

MEPHISTO. Hegener and Glaser have kindly sent me details of the improvements in their MM2 Programme compared with their BLITZ Programme. Those affecting Playing Strength are:

The BLITZ has 3600 opening positions, the MM2 has 6000. The MM2 contains improved End-Game technique.

Other improvements to the Programme are the inclusion of a Position Evaluation function, Chess clock with move counter, Analysis demonstration to 5-ply.

After telling you this you will wonder what on earth I am doing when you get to my actual Rating List for the BLIT2 shows 1 point above the MM2. I think that the MM2 is probably a better Programme than my Ratings are showing at present but, as I have always promised to do, I MUST print out my Rating List exactly as my Computer calculations produce. The explanation for this 'anomaly' is that I have recently received a batch of outstanding results for the Blitz from Computer Chess Report U.S.A whereas my Rating for MM2 is based on a much smaller sample of results. Now that the MM2 is commercially available further results will no doubt be on their way soon. Mephisto would hardly have replaced their Blitz prog. with the MM2, nor used the MM2 as the starter-base for the AMSTERDAM if the MM2 programme wasn't the better! There are some Match Results for the AMSTERDAM later in the NEWS SHEET and I am anticipating having an Amsterdam on Test against my own 'top' Machine in the near future. My best Machine is the F.ELEGANCE 3.6 with CB16 Cartridge; if other Manufacturers/Owners feel brave enough to Test their favourite against the Amsterdam then you can contact me; my wife and I can probably manage to put one person at a time up for a day or two's Testing if everything works out as planned! If you're interested and write me, I'll let you know what can be worked out!

RESULTS SECTION

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A large number this time with many from the Swedish University Testing detailed in the ICCA Journal, others in Computer Chess Reports from the USA and kindly sent to me by Gerald Murphy, information from Countrywide Computers and Eureka Electronics and (most exciting of all!?) Reports from ICD/America of the first Match Results of the Mephisto Amsterdam!

First of all, however, a corrected Table from the 1985 World Micro Championship in Amsterdam. Since publication of NEWS SHEET 2 I have learned that only the Mephisto Amsterdam 1 was running at a speed in excess of the commercially available Model – this was running at 18mhz instead of 12mh as advised to me by Hegener & Glaser 29/11/1985. The Amsterdam 2 and 3 Machines were both at the standard commercial speed which is 12mhz. The corrected Table looks like this:

The Names of the Computers are shown first, then the score and the ELO Rating Performances for the Match are in brackets. However to enable Readers to relate these scores with those given in previous News Sheets, the score from the previous News Sheet is also shown.

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The AVANTE GARDE came 5= in the US Open 6/1985 with $3\frac{1}{2}$ /6 earning a basic Rating of around 2026. However as reported in NEWS SHEET 2 its operator did resign against FIDELITY'S EXCELLENCE in a won/drawn position. It seems Fidelity at that time thought the Excellence was the better Machine and preferred it to score 1 point rather than 0 (or, at best, $\frac{1}{2}$). If Avante Garde had been allowed its draw, its initial Rating would have been around 2075, so I have initialised it at 2060 prior to this result.

F.EXCELLENCE scored 6\frac{1}{2}/11 against Opponents at 1910 = 1983.

Excellence was at 8mhz. Therefore 1983 - 135 adj. = 1848 for 3mhz.

F.ELITE C-scored 6/11 against Opponents at 2070 = 2106.

Elite was at 10mhz. Therefore 2106 - 128 = 1978 for 4mhz.

S.TURBOSTAR KASPAROV scored 6\frac{1}{2}/12 against Opponents at 2081 = 2114
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Turbo 640 was at 6mhz. Therefore 2026 - 57 = 1969 for the 440 4mhz commercial model.

The S.TURBOSTAR 432 comes

close to STARDOM!

Whilst in Hamburg earlier this year, Gary Kasparov played a simultaneous against 32 Chess Computers. One or two, especially the F.Private Line, got close to a Draw but, before they lost 32 - 0, only the TURBOSTAR managed to obtain a winning position. Here it is (or was!) :-

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Kasparov (White) had just played 37. Bg4 threatening the Rook on d7. He said after the Game that Black had the win in this position but, unfortunately, the Turbostar moved its Queen to b3 instead of a4 and the play went:-37.- Qb3 38. Bd7: Qdl:+ 39. Kh2 Rf7 (to stop mate at g7) 40. Be6 Kf8 (Kh3 is terminal) 41. h7 Nd6: 42. h8=Q+ Ke7 43. Bf7: Nf7: 44. Qhg7 and Black resigned.

If 37. Qa4 38. Bd7: Qd7: 39.Qq7: Qg7: 40. hg7: Kg7: 41. d7 Rd8 and Black wins.

The Hamburg Chess professional and Club Coach, Gisbert Jacoby, who scored $26\frac{1}{2}\frac{1}{2}$ in 4hrs. in a 1979 simul. v Computers, took 9hrs. this year against a current selection to win 16 - 8. Mephisto got 3pts, Scicys and Novag 2 each and Fidelity 1.

Sadly Contemporary Chess Computers are unhappy with the order shown in my previous Rating Table and want my printed Table to fall in line with their own (i.e. with Conchess Machines higher). Feeling quite unable to facilitate their request I advised them that it seemed best to remove Conchess Machines from my List and, as they have not yet replied and I am keen to get this News Sheet out before Christmas, that is what I have had to do. It seems to me that my News Sheet provides free publicity for Chess Computers generally and the leading Machines specifically, and Conchess are amongst these. However I don't see why I should do anything to promote a group who, at this time, seem determined to write ungenerous and threatening letters to me after every issue. A shame, and I'm genuinely sorry about it and do hope that it may be righted for the next issue. In the meantime, if anyone would rather buy a Conchess 4 than (quoting similar costs and ability Machines) a Mephisto MM2, Novag Expert or Fidelity Elegance, then I will let you have the Ratings for same according to my own calculations.

CHESS COMPUTER NEWS SHEETS - INTRODUCTION

Because of the continuing increase of new readers I felt it would be wise to issue an INTHODUCTORY INFORMATION SHEET so that everyone will know of the basic intentions and purposes of the NEWS SHEETS. That, as Readers will quickly ascertain, is to provide an INDEPENDENT ASSESSMENT of the CHESS COMPUTERS' PLAYING STRENGTHS. Whilst there will be occasional comment on other aspects of Chess Computers, such things as Quality, Functions, Appearance, Upgradeability atc. can be examined by the prospective CONSUMER himself prior to purchase by careful examination of advertising material or by visiting a retail or distribution source. However Playing Strength cannot be assessed so easily or quickly and, unfortunately, some Manufacturers claims in this area cannot always be taken as read. Independent work in this area appears to be going on quite thoroughly in the United States and parte of Europe and my efforts are intended to make similar information and rating assessments available to consumers in Britain also. Readers will be kept up-to-date with all of the most important TOURNAMENT, MATCH and TEST Scores as they come to me from Manufacturers, Distributors, Independent Test Sources (e.g. the ongoing work being done by the University of Sweden) and especially Consumers themselves who, owning 2 or more Machines, conduct their own Matches. Results of Games against officially rated mortals are equally of real value.

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For my resultant HATING LIST to retain the fullest accuracy it is absolutely necessary that Chees Computers competing against each other should be playing at the same Time Limits, and this speed should preferably be the TOUKNAMENT SPEED of 40 moves in either 2 or 2½ hours. Certainly games played at anything less than 2 mins. per move cannot be assessed for the HATING LIST, though it is agreed that it is often interesting to compare the playing abilities of the Machines at their faster and especially Blitz levels. The HATING TABLE is the ultimate end of my labours – the very many Matches, Tournament and Test Kesults which I have are being continually up-dated by new ones as well as being re-assessed in the light of incoming results. These comparisons and calculations are done by my Sharp Home Computer for which I have created a CHESS COMPUTER HATING SYSTEM, based on the ELO RATING METHOD, but including a full Database for all Cheas Computers (including various Main-frame Programmes), a carefully planned Standard Deviation System which both warns me of the presence of 'peculiar' results as well as limiting the effects of same together with other algorithms and helps to ensure as far as I possibly can that the figures which my Sharp outputs are as accurate and reliable as I can possibly get them. We can remember when rating a CHESS COMPUTER that, unlike a HUMAN, it should not be affected by health, tiredness etc., nor will it improve with experience or deteriorate as old age comes on! Rather, each Computer HAS a fixed ability – the task of the Kater is to pinpoint as accurately as possible what that ability is!

May I affirm again that my labours, finding and conclusions are reached quite independently and the output from my Computing Calculations will always be given exactly as it is produced, regardless of what I or anyone else may wish to see or think should have happened. Also let me confirm that the Rating List is based on RESULIS and not on hardware specifications, programmers expectations or manufacturers hopes. Some feel that the latter need to be taken more seriously and that they are more important than the Results obtained by the Machines. Those who wish to judge Machine Ability on that basis are, of course, welcome and free to do so; however, though initialising a Computer with an estimated figure based on such information, my method ensures (through the use of Reliability and 'Experience' Factors) that Hesults quickly take priority in the calculations - my view is steadfast that it is what the Machine DOES that matters!

Almost alI of the Chess Computers available today, and especially those produced in the last 12 - 18 months, are really good value for money - they will provide worthwhile opposition to all levels of personal playing standard (always buy a Machine BETTEK than you are, but probably not 'infinitely' better!); opening practice, training in tactical skills, blitz (speed) play, testing of new variations, generally improving your level of play (especially by allowing the Machine to show you deficiencies in your own play through use of Demonstrate and Take-Back functions) - I am a firm believer in them for all of the above reasons, and that apart from the sheer pleasure and fun they certainly have and do give to me and, I am confident, any Chess enthulaiest who plays against them.

Finally, there is no specific charge for these NEWS SHEETS - they will come out irregularly depending on the availability of new, worthwhile and interesting material. MANUFACTURER/DISTRIBUTORS can help me by keeping me supplied with full up-dates on Machines handled by them - specifications, prices, results etc; or of course by loaning me any Machine I haven't already got for full Testing and the value (if it does okay!) of independently guaranteed reliable results. Consumers can help by sending me Stamp money from time to time and/or results/position etc. from their own Games and Tests. For those of you who have already done all of these various things, my sincere thanks; also thanks to the many who have sent appreciative comments, encouragement etc. - please keep in touch.
