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Computer Chess NEWS SHEET 20 November 1988

The purpose in publishing the "NEWS SHEET" is to provide a survey of the CHESS COMPUTER scene, with special emphasis on a careful and realistic assessment of the PLAYING STRENGTHS of the many machines. I also work for COMPETENCE LTD (one of the longest established Chess Computer retailers) and enjoy freedom to maintain personal opinions and preferences which I seek to share with readers. Final Games and Articles selection for each Issue is done independently by myself. The NEWS SHEET is financed solely by myself with help from readers whose voluntary contributions are always welcome (please!) but folk who make little attempt to 'pay their way' will not remain on the Mailing List for ever. Articles or Games sent in by readers (or others involved in Chess Computing) will always receive consideration for publication. It is often the lack of such material rather than any editorial bias which determines the final NS content!

Welcome to another Issue of NEWS SHEET. Most of you will find this 8-page NS and an 8-page Booklet on the WORLD MICRO Championship enclosed.. but not everyone! If you haven't received the WORLD MICRO Booklet it means simply that your payments have fallen a bit too far behind my costs. Please don't think of me as being 'mean' for leaving the Booklet out - from my position I am losing well over £50 every Issue by still sending NS out to 'mini-contributors' and it was not the simplest decision to send out even the basic NS20 to them knowing that it mostly represents lost money. If no WORLD MICRO Booklet was enclosed (1) you can have a copy by sending me £1 and (2) if you want future Issues of the NS you will need to send me £5 which will cover you for Issues 21-24 (Foreign Readers £8 in Pounds Sterling for 4 Issues). I would like to use my hard-earned cash to buy myself a new Chess Computer and cannot keep putting such amounts of money, not to mention time, into NS.

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The 1988 WORLD MICRO Championship

This EVENT is reported fully in the separate Booklet detailing astonishing 'on/off/on' problems before the Championship, the 'disappearing' organiser and his 'Disorganizing Committee'; then plenty of high-class and exciting Chess. MEPHISTO won all the Sections in which they were entered though FIDELITY led in the MANUFACTURERS Section in the early stages until the Mephisto team began to make adjustments to their Opening Books and obtained a winning advantage. The distance between the MEPHISTO and FIDELITY Programmes and the others who entered suggested that these two have moved a long way clear of the competition at this time. Which of the two turns out to be strongest in their COMMERCIAL

formats remains to be seen - the Official World Micro Tournaments no longer answer such obvious questions. FIDELITY's Championship programme in its 68000 16MHz MACH III format, holding the Official US MASTER TITLE and 2265 USCF Grading, is already out costing £399. The running speeds, DRAM size, launch dates and prices for the MEPHISTO ALMERIA are still unknown to me at the time of writing this part of NS. STOP PRESS - prices similar to ROMA; 32 bit could be in EXCLUSIVE Board too; release possibly end of November.

New MACHINES coming out

CXG SPHINX. This Programme is already out, in fact, in a choice of 2 Boards. The first is the GALAXY costing £150 on the SUPER ENTERPRISE Board and the other the COMMANDER costing £300 on the wood, auto sensory CXG 3000 Board - both with Scrolling multi-info Displays and lotsalevels etc. The originally intended SPHINX programme was to be David Levy's CYRUS 68000 effort but this never reached the playing strength required by CXG so they have actually got a Franz Morsch programme in it running at 4MHz on the 6502 processor. Morsch was the programmer of the selective search SUPER MONDIAL and, as the SPHINX comes a year later, we can expect it to be stronger.

Andy Roland at Contemporary Chess Computers kindly loaned me one for the Pergamon CHESS "Beat the Masters" and the results of its efforts will appear in the November Issue. One position particularly produced an impressive effort from the Sphinx. In my own testing it came out a little below the Conchess Plymate 5.5MHz, a conclusion with which Andy, who also markets Conchess, agrees. However in Sweden its results are about 30 Elo above mine - still small sample from both of us. Room permitting I will print a couple of its games from my tests. Below is its current Results standing combining all scores in so far.

KASPAROV SIMULTANO. An interesting newcomer for Nov/Dec at £199.99. Advance publicity suggests it may be something close to the STRATOS programme on a press-sensor Board but with a couple of unique additions. (1) The extra LCD Display which can be used to mark a position allowing the user to explore forward analysis and then easily get back to the root position. The Display will show up to 8-Ply of forward analysis which can thus be played through as required on the Board without risk of confusion. (2) The Simultano will play up to 8 games simultaneously giving you the chance to pretend you are a G.M!

MEPHISTO MONTE CARLO. No, it's not a new machine, of course - NS carried a report just after its launch some while ago. However it still hasn't made an appearance on the Swedish lists and, thus far, I have no-one sending in any scores for this programme so it is still rated as per the small sample work I did myself. If anyone has any scores they can let me have from this computer, do please send them to me. Ta.

HITECH STRIKES BACK! After my report in NS19 of the dramatic progress of Chiptest, later re-named DEEP THOUGHT, I now learn that HiTech has been programmed with the singular extension system and is back vying for top spot again. An amazing $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ victory at 40 in 2 hrs has just been achieved against G.M Arnold Denker. Denker of course is some way past his prime and rates at around 2350 nowadays. Even so this is a noteworthy win especially as the G.M is known to be a Chess Computer fan and has experience of playing against them. Both HiTech and Deep Thought would appear to be grading at close to 2500 USCF.

FIDELITY DESIGNER EXCELLENCE. The very popular PAR EXCELLENCE programme in a newly designed modern-look Board with DISPLAY and much extended FEATURES. At £149.95 it must capture much of the Christmas sales.

RESULTS REPORT. This apparently bad idea was introduced a few Issues ago, the idea being to make available a print-out of ALL the Computer vs Computer results known to me fully up-to-date with corresponding full Rating List. The cost was suggested at just £2 but, with the games list growing and growing and only a handful of Readers wanting it, the printing costs for it have escalated and I've had to suspend it for now. Maybe I'll prepare another one with NS21 if a few folk write expressing interest, but it will have to be for around £3-£4.

However it has beaten Super Forte $17\frac{1}{2}-14\frac{1}{2}$ after the Super Forte beat the Sphinx 19-13 in other tests by us.. the result of the older Par Excellence was no fluke if one plays through its games, this is a strong programme too".

BRIEF REPORT on CXG SPHINX

Coming out at a very competitive time, with the Kasparov Simultano and Fidelity Designer Excellence 2100 at quite similar prices to the GALAXY SPHINX, it will be interesting to see how much of the market the latter obtains, though all three of these press-sensory Computers are undoubtedly good value for money.

The SPHINX had a torrid introduction in my games and I found it below the strength of Fid Mach 2, Meph Mega 4 and Nov Super Expert/6, as do the German testers. But the New Zealand Tourny and some early Swedish figures have it closer to them, so we will have to see. Like Franz Morsch's Mondial, Super Mondial and Monte Carlo series of programmes, the SPHINX plays some interesting Chess, using the selective search system to good effect. Against the Meph MM4 and MEGA 4 it seemed quite even with 4 draws in 6 games; the 2 Sphinx losses appeared to be a surprise even to the Mega in a sense in that its evaluations showed no appreciation of what always looked like a useful endgame advantage. Against Nov SUPER EXPERT/6 and Fid MACH 2C it went down more clearly but showed some interesting ideas nevertheless with most of the games being quite competitive. It finally came into its own against the well-known Nov SUPER CONSTELLATION programme, though I only had time to get in a couple of games.

FIDELITY and that MASTER TITLE

The question of whether FIDELITY's new MACH III MASTER will live up to its fine achievement of an Official U.S MASTER Title in its games against Computers is now being tested. This aggressively strong programme with Search Extensions specifically designed for play against Humans which proved itself so successful in the WORLD OPEN is so far also looking good against Computers as well. Early days with just 8 games played at time of writing these notes (6-1=1), but to get 3 games as attractive as the following already whets the appetite somewhat!

NOVAG SUPERS and the VSS FACTOR

Following my report in NS19 about the interesting differences between the VSS and NORMAL modes on Novag's Super Forte and Expert, Tony Leech and I have been doing further tests. Tony has played 20 games between his Novag Super Forte/6 and the Mephisto Mondial/Dallas XL, 10 with Novag on Normal and 10 on VSS; results of games played at 3 mins per move are:-

Normal: Novag 4¹/₂ Mephisto 5¹/₂

VSS : Novag 5 Mephisto 5

Too small a sample to be at all conclusive, of course, but still interesting. Here is a game, played at 2 mins per move using the same Opening for both Modes. I have shown exactly where the Normal and VSS modes diverge and then followed each game through to the end. The games were played between a Novag Super Expert/6 and a Mephisto Roma 16 bit. Here only do Normal and VSS diverge! VSS has 40 Rg8+ for ages but goes deeper than Normal mode and comes up with a weaker move! We continue 1st with the Normal mode.

Thanks for the feedback from NS19 - obviously many of you want to see the vs HUMAN List printed every Issue though, because of space, it will have to be done as a sort of 'Top Forty'!

NOTES

/5 after a Machine indicates its processor speed to distinguish it from the same programme elsewhere on the List running at a different speed.

+/- shows the maximum deviation likely for that Machine. A Computer for which we have many Results will have a low +/- and one with few Results behind it will have a high +/- (i.e. the Rating for the first one is more reliable).

Human Games Column represent each Machine's overall Result in Tournaments against Human opposition. Many folk believe these figures are actually the valuable ones in determining the REAL CHESS ABILITY of the various Computers. These figures are also used to adjust the overall LEVEL of the main List and also appear again in the vs HUMANS List with each Computer in correct vs HUMAN order.

* after a Machine's name in the vs HUMAN List indicates that the Computer is not generally commercially available in that form even though it has appeared, perhaps as a 'special', in a Tournament against Humans. If the Computer becomes properly available, the '*' will be removed and the Machine will start to appear in the MAIN RATING LIST as well.
